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Climate justice concert to honour Earth Day 2022

Christ Church Cathedral and the Emily Carr String Quartet mark Earth Day with 'Earth Songs: Land' concert.

VICTORIA, BC – Music meets environmental awareness on Earth Day 2022 with a special talk by local best-selling author and forest ecologist **Andy MacKinnon**, and a performance of Canadian composer **Marjan Mozetich**'s "Lament in the Trampled Garden" by the **Emily Carr String Quartet**. The event titled *Earth Songs: Land* is the third installment of a six-part concert series title *Earth Songs: Music for Climate Justice*. The concert starts at 5.00 pm on April 22 at **Christ Church Cathedral** (corner of Quadra and Rockland).

In step with Earth Day 2022's theme "Invest in our planet", Andy MacKinnon, Metchosin Councillor and Greater Victoria Public Library Chair, will introduce the concert. Andy has taught rainforest ecology field courses in Bamfield and Tofino (for the University of Victoria) and Haida Gwaii (for UBC). He has also taught mushroom identification courses in Tofino (for the Rainforest Education Society) and in Victoria. He is co-author of six best-selling books about plants of western North America, and co-author of the newly published Royal BC Museum Handbook "Mushrooms of British Columbia," which recently made the Vancouver Sun's "15 best-selling books" list.

The Emily Carr String Quartet will offer two performance pieces, the first being Canadian composer Marjan Mozetich's work, commissioned in 1992 by the Banff String Quartet Competition. The piece titled "Lament in the Trampled Garden" is at once melodic, mournful, evocative, and remarkably accessible. The concert concludes with a complete performance of Johannes Brahms' String Quartet no. 2 in A minor.

Earth Songs: Music for Climate Justice is part of Christ Church Cathedral's commitment to advocacy on behalf of the natural world. The series draws attention to the need for personal action to reverse the climate crisis and features brief talks from climate focused NPOs and advocates with an opportunity to support. Each concert focuses on a different facet of our relationship with the natural world, aiming to educate, entertain, and inspire change. It is supported by the **Gail O'Riordan Climate and the Arts' Legacy Fund at the Victoria Foundation**.

Christ Church Cathedral's Dean, **The Very Reverend M. Ansley Tucker**, is pleased that the cathedral can get involved in projects that help draw attention to the imperative to safeguard, sustain and renew the life of the earth. "Human beings are finally beginning to grasp that we are not the possessors of the earth and its creatures," she says, "but rather one part of a great ecosystem upon which we rely, and which relies upon us."

Featuring: Mark McDonald, The Cathedral Choirs and guest speaker Dr. Alan Batten (astronomer) Drawing attention to the vastness of the solar system has a way of highlighting humanity's need to steward its small home carefully. In a virtuosic organ transcription by Peter Sykes, the cathedral's resident organist takes the audience on a tour from Mars (the bringer of war) to Neptune (the mystic), all in Gustav Holst's inimitable musical language.

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Christ Church Cathedral, located on the traditional lands of the Lekwungen peoples, is the episcopal seat of the Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of British Columbia, which includes Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. The cathedral has a large parish community and contributes to the cultural, social, and spiritual life of Capital Regional District residents and visitors. The Gothic cathedral, one of Canada's largest churches, was designed in 1896.
